New York, June 5.—America's millions of automobiles, like life-bearing capsules, may be kept afloat through the nation's transportation arteries, despite an Axis strangulation, because a Kansas doctor, 12 years ago, failed to discover a cheap anti-freeze.

This was the amazing story revealed here today by Dr. Wilford H. Dow, president of the Dow Chemical Co., heart of a far-flung industrial empire.
