




















# Alan H. Gross

Army Sec. 4 William R. Guenther did not get a chance to meet his firstborn, a two month old girl named Jolynn. He was killed Friday in Vietnam.

According to Army officials, Spec. 4 Guenther died of wounds received in a base camp when the area was hit by hostile rocket-propelled grenades.

"He told us – through his letters - that it was pure hell over there," said his mother, Mrs. Erma Jane Borkowski, 26219 Colman, in Warren.

"He added that if some of the protesters and Dissenters were in Vietnam for even a short time, they'd be glad to come home and would appreciate what we got here," Mrs. Borkowski said, her voice hoarse from crying.

Young Guenther, in the Food Service Section, said he was afraid to sleep at night because of the rocket grenade attacks by the Viet Cong.


"He told of the weather, which was horrible, with lots of mud, rain and not too hot temperatures," Mrs. Borkowski continued, "and to waiting from minute to minute for enemy action."



A Warren marine was killed in Vietnam, and a center Line Air force Sergeant is reported missing after the
crash of an aircraft off the coast of Formosa two days ago, the Defense Department announced today.

Marine Corps Pfc. Dennis J. Gulla, son of Mrs. Virginia Gulla, of 4241 Fourteen Mile, Warren, was killed
as a result of hostile action in Vietnam.

Sgl. Walter E Bechyne, 28, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Bechyne, of 8414 Wainwright, Center Line, is
among 13 U.S. Air Force crewmen reported missing after the crash of a Lockheed HC-130 on which
Bechyne was a spotter.

### Rifle Accident Kills Marine

Rifle Accident Kills Marine

STERLING HEIGHTS - A. 19 year-old U.S. Marine, wounded by an enemy hand grenade less than two months after arriving in Vietnam, died a month later as a result of accidental shooting. Private First Class Dennis J. Gulla died Feb. 3 in Quang Nam Province, Vietnam, after a fellow marine's M-16 rifle accidentally discharged while it was being cleaned. He was helping establish an observation post when wounded. He was helping establish an observation post when wounded. He was hopsitalized for a week with wounds of the right arm and back but returned to action. He notified his brother, Peter, of his wounds but begged that his mother not be informed. Gulla was the son of Mrs. Virginia Gulla, of 424 Horuten Mile Road.

"I was really scared. I (battlefield action) was like driving a car, once I got the feel of things I wasn't scared anymore." Gulla said in a letter to his brother, Peter.

He added that he was looking forward to coming home, after his discharge from the marines to enjoy a rest and did not have any special post-service plans.

He was a rifleman assigned to the Second Battalion of the First marine Division.






































### Warren GI dies in Action

WARREN – A soldier who seldom had time to write or sleep wrote seven letters home to U.S. Army Specialist Fourth Class Thomas Mark Kupiec, 21, whose wife, Patricia, was arrived in Vietnam Nov. 1, 1968.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kupiec, 7204 Timken, Warren, and their daughter
Christine, I.8, got a letter each week. "The letters came one by one and I saw how terrible
it must have been," said his grief-stricken mother. "He was such a good kid. I took care
of him for 21 years and the army couldn't take care of him for 47 days."

She said her son had kidney trouble and had had mononucleosis. "He always drank lots of water and they didn't have good water. I just knew he couldn't survive," she said. "Why don't they wake up in Washington," she said sadly. "There are so many broken hearts. He loved his wife so much. In December he told me to stop sending packages and nears. The foretains with a similar in December 10 told life to stop sending packages and to use the money to send her some roses. He must have had a premonition," she sobbed. One of his more recent letters told of "Viet Cong left and right" with only a little hutch for protection. And then the young man who, his mother said, "didn't want to kill," was himself killed while acting as a gunner.

### Luck Runs out for Warren GI

WARREN-Cpl. Alan Lane, a hero in one mortar attack by the North Vietnamese troops,
died Saturday in another, according to word received here by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paskel Lane, 8244 Continental.

Lane, 20, a Lincoln high School graduate was struck by shell fragments as the North
Vietnamese attacked and died shortly after in a hospital ship.

Lane was born in Detroit, but had lived in the Warren area most of his life. He attended
Busch Junior High School in Center Line, but transferred to Lincoln for his high school
work when his parents moved into Warren. He enlisted shortly after his graduation two

years ago.
"Alan liked the army," said his mother, Pauline. "He wrote quite often and said thinks were fine. Said he'd never been in much danger. But he didn't ever tell us about that thing last March.

thing last March.

In "that affair last March" Cpl. Lane was credited in an army dispatch with saving the lives of 350 members of Battery C, Second Battalion, of the Ninth Artillery, in which he was a howitzer gunner.

He and most of his company was sleeping when the enemy attack started. He awoke and saw a loaded ammunition truck blazing.

He rushed to the truck and tried to drive it to a place when the exploding shells would not

endanger the entire company.

He failed because two other trucks prevented him from going forward or back. So he leaped from the truck and fought the flames for a time with other gunners who had waked when he called for help.

Lane then moved one of the other trucks also loaded out of the area as PFC Salvador Gavaldon of Demming, N.M. moved the third. Then both returned to the fight fire. Although several of the shells exploded, only one man was hurt. He suffered a broken leg from a shell fragment. No one was injured by the enemy fire.

Lane and Gavaldon emerged without a scratch, but Lane told questioners: "You should

have seen that truck. When the shells exploded the wheels went one way and the hood another."

The Lanes, who have two other children, Kenneth and Mrs. Frank Eversole, were notified of their son's death in a telegram from the Department of Defense.
